When the "twelfth step" list is mentioned at your group meeting, it seems logical to remember what Bill said and what works.

Over the last 3 - 4 weeks we've been called by often frantic voice from the answering service (who is doing a magnificent job, just considering how we were when we called), practically pleading for help handling a call.

Now, no one has to plead with us, but those people try to pass the calls around and stay within neighborhoods if possible.

Our lists have shrunk to below bare minimum - some have left for that part of life called death, some have moved, and some are unable and justifiably. But look at our new members collecting blue chips proudly - where are you when the newcomer calls ? "Too busy", "not convenient", "I just got a call" - only a few replies we've had reported.

Some years ago when I called - a pleasant, warm, soon to become wonderful person returned the call and shared her experience, strength, and hope with this suffering alcoholic. Thank God for her, and for all those who

continued to share.

No lectures - no recriminations - just a thought or two for reflection. Did someone talk to you when you were hurting and scared ? Were you shown there was a "way out" ? Were you given hope by an anonymous voice ? Did you ever hear your story at a meeting ?

Those things don't just happen - we are responsible - co share, to tell our stories, to help man the phones, to give our own "vision of hope."

A special word to our young people and women. More and more, you are calling and

attending meetings. We need you.

Next time the list is mentioned, sign your name and help yourself by helping someone else. Let's remember Bill W's words and use the "language of the heart."
