


CALENDAR OF EVENTS:

PERSPECTIVES.....

Although 'famous people' in America often appear to be more fortunate than many, we owe them a debt of gratitude, of sorts, because some of them suffer from the same illnesses or diseases we do. Some recover, and some die. Either way, silences are suddenly broken, taboos become 'fashionable', and the government suddenly 'finds' alot of money to spend on research and treatment. Most of the time.

The fact is, long before Rock Hudson died, long before Betty Ford 'went public', people were dying by the thousands, and most Americans appeared to care less. But when our 'idols' become victims, suddenly, people care, people send money, people write best selling books, go on T.V. to reveal their 'sepcial problem', and people open treatment centers for diseases which were once unmentionable, much less publicly admitted.

The <u>truth</u> is - long before 'recovery' became a business, there was A.A. And by the grace of God, there still is.

This "business of recovery", of treatment centers, 'How-To' books, videos, and self-help groups for almost every illness now known, has its pros & cons, its detractors and supporters. No where is this more true than within the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous. On the positive side, the 'recovery business' has saved many lives. The general population is now more aware of the dangers drinking poses not only to adults, but to our children who live in a society where its not only legal, but encouraged, despite the staggering loss of lives and the financial chaos involved with alcohol abuse. The 'recovery business' makes it somehow more acceptable to admit our lives are unmanageable, and as treatment centers flower in most major cities, medical/psychological help and support is available to many who might die without it.

On the other side of this very controversial coin, the business of recovery is just that - a business. And all businesses cost money. Alot of money. And paperwork which results in more paperwork, and delays, and sometimes, mistakes. The "business of recovery" is not fair or unfair. Its simply business. But it does seem somewhat un-realistic to expect that the alcoholic, finally reaching the bottom of the bottle and his disease, will have the \$5,000 - \$15,000 required for an in-patient treatment program, to say nothing of the 'required' insurance, personal physician, and other stipulations.

The <u>truth</u> is - alot of full-blown alcoholics don't even have wallets! And the only <u>real</u> solution, the proven "way back", is Alcoholics Anonymous. Pure and simply A.A. And perhaps thats because A.A. is <u>not</u> a business. Never was, never will be. They don't charge, there are no forms to sign, insurance claims, its not 'organized', it doesn't ask who your doctor is, doesn't substitute drugs for drugs, it doesn't ask your age, race, religion or even your name! All A.A. asks is that you have the desire to stop drinking. Thats all. Pure and simple.

And so for most people, from those coming down from the posh treatment center to those coming up from the gutter, its to the doors of A.A. where most will come and remain and, above all, recover. And thats because, when all is said or done, when all the glitter and publicity and "business" is cast aside, Alcoholics Anonymous works. Pure and simple.

And perhaps, just perhaps, theres a lesson to be learned from this miracle....
