

June 10, 1935

60 years old



On the way to City Hospital on the east side of town, Dr. Bob held out his hand from time to time to see if the shakes had subsided. Just before they stopped, Bill, who also had his practical side, gave him a bottle of beer. Bill and Anne went back to the house to wait. After many hours, Bob phoned to tell them that the operation had been successful. Still he didn't return after the call. Had he gone out to celebrate? Anne and Bill had no idea; they could only wait.

Finally, Dr. Bob came home. He had spent the hours after the operation making restitution to friends and acquaintances in Akron. The bottle of beer Bill gave him that morning was the last drink he ever had.

Although arguments have been and will be made for other significant occasions in A.A. history, it is generally agreed that Alcoholics Anonymous began right there, in Akron, on that date, June 10, 1935.

The Home Group—What Is It?

I used to hear members talk about their "home group" as if there was something special about it. And sometimes a visitor would ask, "Is this your home group?" "I guess so," I would reply, since it was the group I went to more frequently that others. But I secretly wondered what all the fuss was about. I mean, did it really matter?

And that's how I felt until I read the pamphlet "The Home Group." I quickly came to realize that there real-

ly was something special about the home group—my home group. To start with, it was the place where I first felt the fellowship and the sincere welcome that the members offered me. As I became more involved, I realized that my home group could almost be looked upon as my new family. They began to know me and to help me.

The next thing I experienced was a desire to repay some of the kindheartedness. I started helping with the coffee and clearing away. In no time at all I really felt I belonged. I wanted to play an active part—and that helped me to stay sober. And I learned a great

Selfish Program? Not So.

How many times have we heard at meetings that ours is a selfish program? Maybe those who keep making that statement haven't read page 62 of the Big Book. Here's what it says:

"Selfishness—self-centeredness! That, we think, is the root of our troubles. Driven by a hundred forms of fear, self-delusion, self-seeking, and self-pity, we step on the toes of our fellows and they retaliate. Sometimes they hurt us, seemingly without provocation, but we invariably find that at some time in the past we have made decisions based on self which later placed us in a position to be hurt.

"So our troubles, we think, are basically of our own making. They arise out of ourselves, and the alcoholic is an extreme example of self-will run riot, though he usually doesn't think so. Above everything, we alcoholics must be rid of selfishness. We must, or it kills us!"



The Financial Report was read and approved (and is printed in this month's *Mountain Doin's*—Ed.) It was noted that contribution income declined over the three months of the first quarter, but that this is a seasonal effect that occurs each year.

It was announced that the Annual Seminar of Central Office (Intergroup) employees and volunteers of the U.S. and Canada will be held in Atlanta on October 5 and 6. It was suggested that our Central Office's Office Manager Bob V. might attend. Final decision will be reached in the July meeting of the Board.

There was a good deal of discussion about the need of the North Carolina service structure for timely records of individual groups in the State. The Board will discuss this matter when further details of the new system, which the State structure is creating, become available. There being no further business to discuss the meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

Don't Ride It Out Alone

Practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail. *This is out twelfth suggestion:* Carry this message to other alcoholics! You can help when no one else can. You can secure their confidence when others fail. Remember, they are very ill.

Life will take on new meaning. To watch people recover, to see them help others, to watch loneliness vanish, to have a host of friends—this is an experience you must not miss. We know you will not want to miss it. Frequent contact with newcomers and with each other is the bright spot of our lives.

Bill W.

Bill W. unknowingly became not only co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, he also became the first sponsor, sponsoring Dr. Bob. Although it wasn't called sponsorship at that time, both Bill and Bob extended the hand of hope and friendship to those still sick and suffering.

It was in this common need that A.A. was created: the importance of sponsorship, one alcoholic helping another, became and still is essential.

Q. When and why was the Lord's Prayer introduced into A.A.?

A: In the early days, A.A. was more religiously oriented. We had no literature, not even a name, so the early groups leaned heavily on Bible reading for inspiration and guidance. Besides, using the Lord's Prayer at meetings freed speakers from the task, embarrassing to many, of composing prayers of their own. As time went on, Bill W. explains in A.A. Comes of Age, "We began to emphasize the fact that A.A. was a way of life that conflicted with no one's religious belief."


