A Fresh Perspective

Totally overwhelmed at work at 12 years sober, he found the path to peace just down the road.

When I was 12 years sober, I had a lot of difficulty at work. My job as a visiting assistant professor at a university was on shaky ground.

My employment contract was only renewed year to year, so I seemed to be constantly looking for another job. I was also being assigned to teach classes that were outside the subject area I had studied (in order to be blessed with a PhD at nine years sober), and I was having to make things up as I went along. My Higher Power was definitely carrying me through the experience. I constantly felt overwhelmed and out of my mind for a lot of that time.

But not after work on Mondays, once a month. That day I got to drive from the university to a hospital nearby and head up a couple of floors to a treatment center to help chair an AA meeting. It was a room full of other alcoholics, most of them in their very first days of sobriety, and it always made me feel right at home. I got to take my time and set up the chairs and distribute the pamphlets on a table before they all came in. I would then settle in before everyone arrived. Some pulled their chairs as far away from the front table as possible. I could definitely identify with that impulse for sure.

I would be joined by another outside member, my co-chair, and an AA speaker. Sometimes they brought another sober friend along. Whether I was the one chairing that day or the one introducing the speaker, I found myself wonderfully plugged in. The "heart warmth" in the room always drew my focus and took my attention off of my difficulties, especially my job. It made me feel that I'd be all right no matter what.

As I looked at everyone in the room, I'd realize that no matter what their sick heads were telling them, they would be OK or better than OK, as long as they grabbed hold of this program. I thought, what a gift it is for them that they have sobriety today, whether they can see it yet or not.

Then it hit me: Wow, that's true for me too!

One night at one of our meetings there, I saw a familiar face in the front row. He was

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the son of a fellow member at my home group. I had seen this guy in and out of meetings before. Back then he was probably sober, but on this day he definitely was not. His eyes were wide and void. He tried to tie his shoes and couldn't finish. He tried to talk during the question-and-answer part of the meeting and couldn't manage that either. Poor kid, I thought, in his 20s, just like I was before I got sober when I was dying of alcoholism.

Somehow the fact that I knew his family helped me see the tragedy that was sitting there in that chair more clearly. His family was going through what my loved ones must have gone through. They may have helped him get into treatment, but he was not doing well, not at all. As sad as that was, it made me grateful that because of this program I was doing well, no matter what went on at my job.

A year later, I was out of work and on unemployment. I came to our annual AA convention in that same area and there he was again, the young guy from the hospital—same face, but alive now in his eyes and smiling. He was sober. He walked over and said hello and we talked. It was hard to believe that I was talking to the same guy. Maybe in a way I wasn't. I'm certainly not the same guy who used to drink and drug, am I?

At that same convention, I saw a guy from my home group who told me that he was about to start school. He said that what I had shared in meetings about getting my PhD was part of the reason he started college. I had helped inspire him. I felt like this guy's statement was, in a way, my Higher Power telling me, "I have more important reasons for getting you that degree than a job."

Finding that job so close to a treatment center was not my doing. That job just fell into place. And as nice as that job was, all things considered, it didn't compare to what I got to do just down the road from it: to be able to sit with alcoholics at the start of their sobriety journey and get a fresh perspective on mine.



Central Office is looking to fill three Board positions: Chair, Secretary, and 12th Step Call Volunteer Coordinator. Below are the responsibilities and requirements for each position. If you are interested, please attend the next COR/Board meeting, Thursday, November 9 at 6:00pm, via zoom. Chair (2-year term that begins January 2024)

1. Shall preside at Central Office Board and COR General Committee meetings.

2. Shall see that all decisions of the Committees are acted upon.

3. Pursuant to specific authority given on occasion by the Committees, may sign and deliver contracts and other documents in the name of North Carolina Mountain Central Office Inc.

4. With the recommendation and approval of the Central Office Board, shall call for eligible people to stand for positions and appoint chairpersons of standing and special subcommittees.

5. May vote, bring motions, initiate and engage in discussion and debate at board meetings in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order for Small Groups.

6. Shall perform all duties incident to the office of Chair and other duties that may occasionally be assigned by the Committees.

7. Shall have five years' continuous sobriety at the time of taking office.

Secretary (2-year term that begins January 2024)

1. Shall perform all duties incident to the office and others as assigned.

2. Shall attend and take minutes of all COR General Committee and Central Office Board meetings and have copies available at the Central Office's customary place of business within 14 days after the meeting.

3. Shall follow the Alternate Chair in line of succession to the Chair at board meetings.

4. Shall have at least five years' continuous sobriety at the time of taking office.

12th Step Call Volunteer Coordinator (an appointed position)

1. Has responsibility for maintaining the 12th Step Call Volunteer List.

2. Recruits new volunteers.

3. Works with the office manager to keep the 12th Step Call Volunteer List information current.

4. Attends Board and General Committee meetings as a voting member.

5. Shall have at least three years of continuous sobriety.

6. The suggested term will be three years.

"Reflecting guidance from the Additional Consideration of the 1999 Conference Committee on International Conventions/Regional Forums, the trustees' Committee on International Conventions/Regional Forums suggested that the area/state/provincial committees be made aware that experience has shown that planning a local A.A. event such as a convention, too near the dates of an International Convention may result in a smaller attendance at the local event; this notice to be sent out annually starting three years prior to each International Convention."
